

## GRADE ONE NEWS from Mrs. Nowosad

It looks like spring and warmer weather may finally be here! It's been a long winter and we are ready to enjoy some warmth and sunshine.

We have been working on a Friends unit in Language Arts. We have completed a variety of activities to help learn about friendship. Some of these included learning different characteristics of positive and negative friendships, as well as qualities we might look for in a friend. Also, we role played different scenarios of ways to make a

friend or ways to lose a friend. Students had an opportunity to interview one of their peers and create a written piece from what they learned.

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### GRADE TWO NEWS from Mrs. Gregory

The grade 2 class continues to work hard on improving their reading and writing skills. Our mini theme this month has been pioneers. We have been reading some Little House on the Prairie books and doing a variety of reading and writing activities. We read a pio-



neer diary and made a chart to compare how things were long ago and today. We have also used a Venn diagram to sort things that belonged in the past and now.

In spelling we have been learning rules to use when adding endings to base words.

During the past month we have been working on improving Adding and Subtraction how quickly we can do our subtraction and addition facts. We have been using money and a hundred chart to add groups of tens to numbers. We have also been measuring using a variety of nonstandard units. We can measure using multiple units as well as just a single unit.

Our Celebration of Learning was well attended and everyone did a great job showing their work to their parents.

### **GRADE FOUR NEWS from Mrs. Routledge**


Spring is finally here and we are excited for some warmer temperatures! The playground is almost dry so fingers crossed soon we will be in sandals instead of rubber boots!


the year.

#### VOCATIONAL PRESENTATION

On Thursday, April 26, Grade 9-11 students attended a presentation on vocational courses in the division. Students travel to the vocational instruction school for the entire day during this program with transportation being provided. Students are responsible for completing required courses for graduation.

Mr. Larry Schroeder spoke about the Carpentry program. This is a two year program offered in the second semester of the Gr. 11 & 12 year. Students have the opportunity of receiving 4 academic credits each year. If they successfully complete the program they can challenge the Level 1 Apprentice exam and will have 1/2 of the practical hours required for Level 1.

Mr. Alan Wilson spoke on the Nature Studies Program. This program is also offered in the second semester and offers four credit courses: Outdoor Education, Resource Habitat Management and Tourism. More information is available through Twitter or Instagram—just search PWSD Nature Studies. This year HCI student Michelle Bell is taking this program

and features three levels. This is also offered in the second semester.

She also spoke on the Health Care Aide Program offered at Birtle. During the first semester students take part in a daily video conference class with an instructor from Assiniboine Community College. Beginning in February students travel to Birtle where they spend time learning theory and hands on training. They then have practicum sessions at personal care homes and acute health centre and a final practicum where they can choose their location. Students who complete the program are graduates of the ACC Health Care Aide Program as well as earning high school graduation credits.

### KIM McCONNELL VISITS HCI

On Friday, April 13<sup>th</sup>, Hamiota Collegiate welcomed Kim McConnell, an alumnus of HCI to speak to the students. He was recently inducted as a member of the Order of Canada. Mr. McConnell's induction ceremony was held on January 24, 2018. Following is what was read at the ceremony.

"Kim McConnell, C.M. Okotoks, Alberta

Kim McConnell is a leading voice for Canada's agriculture industry. Founder of AdFarm, he is considered a pioneer of agricultural marketing in North America and has spearheaded numerous successful national and international campaigns that have helped this important sector thrive. He is widely sought after for his insight on modern media and is a devoted member of a wide range of farming and community organizations. He is also known for fostering entrepreneurship and for mentoring youth in rural communities."

An engaging speaker, Mr. McConnell spoke to the students about how lucky he had been in his life. He credited his parents, his school, his community and 4-H as major influences. He spoke about the advantage of attending a small rural school where students can be involved in sports, drama and other extracurricular and community activities. He also stressed the advantage of being raised on a farm



and the value of an agricultural degree in today's workplace.
