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KINDERGARTEN NEWS from Ms. Surovy

It's certainly hard to believe that we are already into the final stretch of the school year! I am so proud of how far we have come since the beginning of the year and I am excited to see

how much learning we can squeeze into the final months of school.

I wanted to start by thanking all of the families that came out to Celebration of Learning on April 17 and

18. Some of our favorite things to share were our "Me Books" where students completed sentences and drew pictures about themselves, their families, and their community. We also enjoyed displaying our 3D Season Trees for Science and showing off some of our Alphabet Centre work. It was wonderful to catch up with everyone and see all of Kindergarten students so excited to share their learning with their families.

Throughout the month of April, we have also been working on Easter and Spring themed math centres to practice our counting, subitizing, number sense, and patterning skills. We have also been working on printing and forming our numbers properly. This month, we have also been busy representing numbers in different ways by searching for Easter eggs in our sensory tub and placing them in the proper basket!

We have now learned all of the letters of the Alphabet! Students had so much fun travelling to Letterland each week to meet a new character and learn all about each letter during our Alphabet Centres. We will celebrate our learning with an Alphabet Party at the beginning of May! More information about this will be sent home in BEAR Books in the coming weeks. We will continue to work on our letter sounds and printing as part of our Literacy Centres. During this time, we also learn how to read while working in our Guided Reading groups. Students have been working hard to use picture cues to help them read pattern books and have begun to work on sounding out words. We have also been busy learning our

Kindergarten High Frequency words, practicing how to read and spell each word during our Morning Meeting and while working at our Literacy Centres.

Our Home Reading program is in full swing! Students love choosing their Home

Reading book at the end of the day and I am very excited to see the progress students are making in their reading. Thank-you to all of our parents for supporting this program! Please remember to log Home Reading Books that have been read in the R.E.D. (Read Every Day) section of BEAR Books each night.

This month, we have also been busy with several writing projects. We have spent some time writing our spring and we just completed an Earth Day writing project where we discussed different ways that

we can help the Earth stay healthy. We are now able to write two sentences using our High Frequency words and phonetic spelling!

Our class has also been busy learning all about the Zones of Regulation, a program that helps students learn about self-regulation and emotional control. We have had lots of fun exploring the four zones of regulation and learning about some of the characters from Disney's "Inside Out" in the process! This month, we have been working on making a poster for each of the Zones. Throughout the month of March, we have also focused on learning about "Integrity.



"We read Jory John's "The Good Egg" and discussed several different ways that the characters show Integrity. Next month we will be focusing on "Responsibility" as our character trait of the month.

GRADE ONE NEWS from Mrs. Nowosad

April has sure flown by, and we are so happy to see the sun and the grass!

We continue to be busy in Grade 1, working hard to master our addition facts as well as solving addition and subtraction word problems. We are working on our graphing unit, which has been fun and even included graphing some jelly beans at Easter time.

In Language Arts, we did a large research project on animals. Students were able to go to the website www.pebblego.com to read and listen to information about a variety of different animals. They were able to choose one that interested them, research the required information and then create some awesome animal booklets. I am very proud of the hard work each student put into this project. We have also been

working on sequencing stories and using transition words when retelling a story.

In Science, we have been working on our unit called Characteristics of Living Things. We have learned what characteristics are needed for something to be living. We have planted some marigolds and bean seeds and are anxiously waiting to see how well they will grow.

I am very proud of our Grade 1 and Grade 4 classes for taking some time to go and help clean up our playground. There was a ton of garbage that they were able to pick up to help make it look much better!

GRADE 2 NEWS from Mrs. Gregory & Mrs. McNabb

The grade two classroom continues to be a busy place to learn and have fun. In math, we have been working on problems that require subtracting 2 digit numbers. We continue to practise decomposing numbers to help us sub-

tract. It has been fun trying to come up with some incredible equations to equal a given num-

ber. We completed a wanted poster for a number by representing it in many different ways. We have also been measuring using a variety of nonstandard units. We continue to work on predicting an element in a repeating pattern as well

as extending increasing patterns. In science we continue to work on our unit on Position and Motion.



We have made ramps and tested to see if objects would roll or slide down the ramp. We also covered pennies with different materials to test which ones were the best and worst sliders. Everyone enjoyed letting toy cars go down low, medium and high ramps. We measured how far the cars would go and discovered the cars went furthest on the medium and high ramps and didn't go as far when going down the



low ramps. We have also learned about six simple machines. The Grade 2's have been sharpening their pencils, writing entertaining Easter stories with a

focus on developing a strong beginning, middle and end They are learning about parts of speech such as nouns, verbs and adjectives.

They had fun writing List Poems using a describing word and a noun. Here are a few ... enjoy!!!

This past month we had our Celebration of Learning day and evaluated the goals we set for ourselves in November. Many of the goals ranged from getting faster at multiplication to improving reading levels to having nicer handwriting. We discovered that some people were quite successful at accomplishing what they had set out to do, while others still need a little more time to reach their goal. We would like to thank all the parents who were able to come in for Celebration of Learning to look at our social studies projects, French videos and other things we have accomplished.

We just wrapped up our social studies unit this week, and are looking forward to starting a science unit on the human body! We will be starting by looking at nutrition labels and learning how to evaluate which foods are better for us. We will also be looking at the many different systems it takes for our bodies to run smoothly.

In math, we are working on fractions and decimals and

the many ways to represent them. One thing we are struggling to remember is when we change a fraction to a decimal, we have to make sure the denominator is 10, 100 or 1000.

In language arts, we have just completed our research projects where we had to organize our research into paragraphs with topic sentences, concluding sentences, and lots of details in between. We have now begun to do a novel called 'Mrs. Frisby and the Rats of NIMH' with our main focus being to develop our vocabulary.

Are YOU or someone YOU KNOW going into GRADE 6 this fall?

Every day we make decisions that protect ourselves and the people around us to keep everyone safe. We are taught to wear a seatbelt when riding in a car, to stay home from school when we are sick, and we get immunizations to keep ourselves and everyone around us healthy today, tomorrow and in the future.



Grade 6 students will receive three vaccines in the 2019-2020 school year. These vaccines are Hepatitis B, HPV (Human Papillomavirus) and Meningococcal and they are all very important. These vaccines prepare young bodies with a defense (antibodies) that will protect against these diseases, if and when they are exposed to them at an older age. Our goal, as health care providers, is to help protect all children against serious diseases.

All of these vaccines protect against serious infections. The Hepatitis B vaccine protects against liver disease. The HPV vaccine protects against several HPV viral infections, some of which can lead to certain types of cancers. The meningococcal vaccine protects against a life-threatening illness, caused by a bacteria that can infect the blood and brain.

These vaccines work best when given at a younger age for two reasons. It allows children to develop an immune response before they are exposed to the viruses and younger people create more antibodies to the vaccine than those in their late teens. Immunizing as many children as possible also helps to protect those that cannot be immunized because of other serious health issues.

Information about these vaccines and a consent form will be sent home with all Grade 6 children in Sept 2019.

CLASSROOM ENERGY DIET


Mrs. Obach's Grade 6 Class






PARK WEST SCHOOL DIVISION

Bob Caldwell was born in Hamiota. He is a graduate of Hamiota Collegiate, where he was active in all sports, winning the Male Athlete of the Year award. He also played with the Senior Red Sox for 8 years and on the Senior Hockey team. He



began his teaching career in Deloraine in 1975. He is now retired from teaching. He has years of experience working with hockey players from Initiation Program through to NCAA and believes strongly that teaching skills and fundamentals are the keys to developing quality players. Experiences include being guest coach with Canada's national team, traveling to Russia to study their system in the 1970's, participating in the Hockey Canada- Hockey Finland coach exchange and coaching with Andy Murray at Western Michigan University. He coached the U18 team in Poland and also travelled to Romania in efforts to help them develop their hockey programs. He has also facilitated coach programs in Finland and Scotland. Bob has prepared and produced 5 DVDs on puck control and small area games that he makes available free of charge to all coaches who attend skills seminars. He also developed the three level "Developing Skilled Defenseman" seminars for Hockey Canada's coach's program. Bob has filled a number of volunteer roles: serving as Hockey Manitoba Master Mentor, sitting on Hockey Canada's Checking Committee and National Coach Mentorship Advisory Council and is past chair of Sport Manitoba's Advisory Board. Bob was one of the driving forces behind the formation of the National Coach Mentorship Program. In 2012, Bob was named Hockey Manitoba's Volunteer of the year and in 2015 was the recipient of the prestigious Hockey Canada's Gordon Juckes Award presented to the person who has made exceptional contributions to the development of amateur hockey in Canada. In 2018, he was the winner of the Brandon Sun Community Leader Coaching Award and was inducted into Brandon University Sports Hall of Fame.
