

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


Grade Two News

Grade Four News




The end of February is here already and ole man winter won't give us a break! Luckily, we have had plenty to do inside while the cold wind blows outside.




Currently, the Grade 4 kids have started their 2nd Literacy Place Book Club.


Grade Five News

We decided that **Eveline Juce, Kyle Feschuck, Randy Kirk and Ashley Jay** would be the best people to create this business with.

Our wanted profit is 250 or more. To start our business we needed a two hundred starting capital, which the group members provided.

The shares of our business were sold to just our members, totalling our business cash at \$120.00. We want to provide homemade baked goods that appeal to all ages. This will give us enough to start off our business. After everything is finished we will be splitting the money between the four of us.

The Pie's The Limit (Dale McTavish, Mark Lawn, Ryan Schweitzer, Jason Ritchie, Cody Pope) business is to make pizza. Members of the group made initial investments for ingredients. They decided to make three different types of pizza, Pepperoni, Cheese and Hawaiian. The pizza was made and sold frozen. 
Middle Years Council by Kara Kent
