

We have been working on 2 main The Mitten by: stories: Jan Brett and Sadie and The Snowman by: Allen Morgan. The comprehension strategies we have been focusing on are retelling, sequencing and story mapping. In our class we have graphed whether we like to wear mittens, gloves, or bare hands when we play outside. Most of us wear mittens and thankfully nobody wears bare hands in the snow! Do you know what season we enjoy the best?

We like summer, winter, then fall, with spring being the season we like the least. Together, our class



created a book called, "Our Favorite Seasons." Graphs give us all sorts of information! In math, we are counting buttons to match the number on the snowmen and creating and extending patterns using our mittens.



Learning to read is so exciting for us. New sight words are being introduced at school and soon sight word books will be sent home. on the last day before the break.




read a story called, A Rumble and A Grumble. From this story, students had to

FEBRUARY IS "I LOVE TO READ MONTH".

This is an article from the Reading Recovery Newsletter that might be helpful to parents who are doing the important job of helping new readers at home.

Helping out the beginning reader at home:

What can you say besides "Sound it out?"

There are many things you can say to help your child figure out a word. Being flexible in problem solving provides more information to allow the child to be successful.

To help a child use meaning (of the story or illustrations):

Look at the picture to help yourself.

Think about what would make sense.

To help a child use language structure (the way we talk):

Does that sound right?

Can we say it that way?

To help a child use information in print (the way the word looks):

Look at how the word begins.

Read the words up to the tricky word and start it.

Say more of the word.

Does that look right to you?

To help a child use two sources of information:

Think about what would look right and make sense.

Think about what would make sense and start like that.


A frustrated reader is a reader who is not going to take necessary risks to improve his skills. If your child is still struggling after 5-6 seconds, say the word. Praise the child's attempt by saying:

I like the way you tried to help yourself.

You were nearly right.

You noticed it wasn't right. What did you notice?

A reader is like an athlete. The more a child reads, the better his or her reading becomes.



Since Christmas break we have had a good balance of hard work and fun activities. In January our mini theme was on penguins. We read and learned many interesting facts about these birds. We wrote stories about penguins as well as researched a penguin of our choice.

In math we have be practising the different strategies for adding numbers up to 18. We have also been working on adding and subtracting 2 digit numbers using an empty number line. We have been learning different strategies for problem solving.

Our community is the topic we have been working on in social studies. We have learned about villages, towns and cities as well as urban and rural communities. We have written a story about an important place in our community. Creating a diorama of

our natural resources was a project we enjoyed doing. We even interviewed someone we knew about their jobs in our community.

There are many exciting events coming up in the near future. We are looking forward to going skating for our Valentine's Party. We will also be celebrating the 100th day of school this month. February is I Love to Read month and Mrs. Smith always has some interesting and fun activities for us to do.

GRADE TWO NEWS by Mrs. Obach's Grade 2's

We have been busy in Grade 2. A lot has happened since our last newsletter. We are still having fun each day of Grade 2.

Our class planned National Sweater Day in our school on February 5th. The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) organizes this special day every year and the OLCS Kindergartens told us about it. 



GRADE FIVE NEWS

What an exciting time! January...the month when we have several five day weeks, and nothing to do but learn! And that's exactly what we've been doing.

We came back after Christmas to start a measurement unit in math. We've been learning about perimeter, area, volume, and capacity. We're using plain units, square units, and cubic units...and sometimes it gets a little tricky in keeping them all straight!



In LA we've been doing some guided reading, and working on a strategy called synthesizing. Basically this means we're working on identifying the main ideas. We're also starting to work on persuasive writing and have brainstormed many things we would like to change!

Science has us working on `Properties of and Changes in Substances`. We are doing many experiments, including ones to identify reversible and non-reversible changes, as well as physical and chemical changes. We are having lots of fun with this unit, and

enjoy working in a group to do what we need to do.




ROOTS OF EMPATHY
