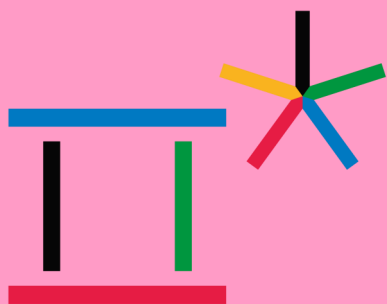

Jude: I will be doing gymnastics. I would be doing a bridge and backflips.

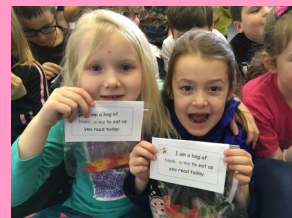
Teagan: I will be watching the 2111 Olympics on TV. My favourites will be curling and figure skating.

February has been a short month but we have been busy! The Grade 4 students have been working hard to complete our Book Clubs this month. Our theme has been “Kids Can Do It!” Helping others is the central idea behind our reading. We have also been enjoying the Olympic themed activities in and out of the classroom! In language arts we researched interesting facts about the Olympics; past and present. It was interesting to see how the Olympics and the athletes have changed over the years!

Multiplying and dividing continue to be our BIG goal in math. The students have explored multiplication and division strategies such as; doubling, skip counting, using arrays, and related facts. Now, we are really trying hard to memorize our facts up to 9x9. When we begin multiplying larger numbers it is very important that the students can recall their facts quickly and accurately.

We are wrapping up our science unit on Rocks and Minerals this month. The students were excited to model how metamorphic rock is made deep within the earth, using modelling clay, heat and pressure.

Our Valentine party was a hit as usual! HES students enjoyed an afternoon of skating at the rink as well as a yummy treat upon their return.

It is hard to believe that soon, March will be here! Let’s hope mother nature is kind to us!

GRADE FIVE R NEWS FROM MRS. ROUTLEDGE

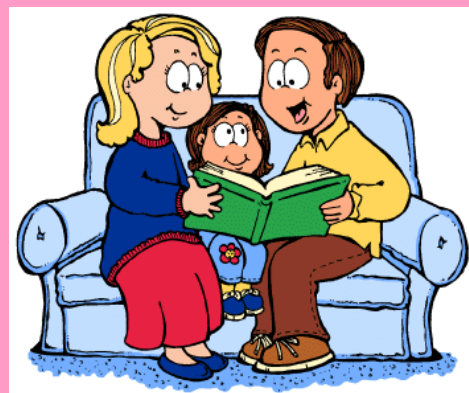
Wow! I can't believe another month has flown by. Before you know it we'll be counting the days until spring break!

During the last few weeks in LA, we have been tracking medal counts at the Olympics, and researching a variety of things. The number of athletes sent by each country, for example, and the reason why Russia isn't at the Olympics. We've also been researching different Canadian athletes, including how they got involved in their sport. We're soon going to start research projects on Canada's Indigenous people for social studies. We also continue to work on our contract reading. This means every student has a book to read by a specific date. Parents, please take a few minutes and talk to your child about their book; maybe even listen to them read if you have the time.

In math, we have just wrapped up our measurement unit and are now working on division. We have talked about finding quotients by halving, and are working on estimating quotients. This will be a short unit, and I encourage parents to continue to work on facts at home to make the rest of this unit a little easier.

We are also just finishing our science unit on "Properties of And Changes in Substances". We have done lots of experiments, and now know the states of matter, the changes of state and the difference between physical and chemical changes just for starters. Next, we will be doing a social studies unit called "European Colonization" where we'll be learning about the first European settlers.

A few other things that are coming up are Pink Day, festival, and Jump Rope for Heart. The dates should be in your child's agenda!



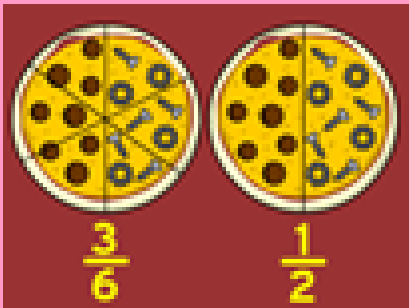

GRADE FIVE S NEWS FROM MISS SCHETTLER



Wow February went fast! The grade 5's seem to be liking the long weekends! We have been busy curling, having guest readers and getting ready for the Olympics!

In ELA we finished our creative writing stories about the toys coming alive. Currently, some students are finishing typing. Parents you'll be able to read their stories soon! With the Olympics on in Pyeong Chang we have been using this as an opportunity to brush up on some researching skills. Each student researched Pyeong Chang and a Canadian athlete. Our bulletin board shows the medal standings and is updated daily by 3 different students. We will continue to learn about the Olympics as the Paralympics begin.

Math has been full of fractions this month. We looked at equivalent fractions and how to make them by "multiplying the top and bottom by the same number". Everyone completed a pixel drawing that showed two fractions for each colour they used in their picture. We are currently comparing fractions with unlike denominators. Next we will start looking at decimals.

Our substances unit in science is now completed as we wrapped up with a Kahoot review. The students had fun learning about hazardous substances they can find at home and discussing why we shouldn't partake in the Tide Pod Challenge. We also completed many experiments including a chewing gum experiment. Students learnt about the amount of sugar in gum by weighing a piece of gum before and after chewing it. We will be starting a new social studies unit next.

On a side note, with the warmer weather sticking around the grade 5's are reminded to follow the hands off policy at recess. Students will start missing recess otherwise.

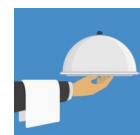


MIDDLE YEARS STUDENTS ATTEND PROJECT 11 SUMMIT


On January 31, all of the students from grade 6-8 attended the first annual Project 11 Mental Wellness Summit at the Burton Cummings Theatre in Winnipeg. This event was organized through Project 11 and the True North Foundation and hosted speakers for the afternoon which all shared a mental wellness message. This event took place on Bell Lets Talk day and the first speaker was Shea



Emry a representative with Bell Lets Talk and ex-CFL player. He spoke of his difficulties with mental illness and his message was that you are never alone. Next, we had Cameron Hughes perform and speak. You may have seen him before at sporting events as he travels around North America to a variety sporting events as a crowd entertainer. He pumps up the crowd through dancing and cheering. He had a message for the students to never underestimate the power of cheer. He encouraged students to be themselves and to have fun. The last speaker was Craig Heisinger, the assistant general manager and senior vice president of hockey operations for the Winnipeg Jets. Craig spoke of his relationship with Rick Rypien and the formation of the Project 11 program. He had a very powerful and emotional message for students. One of the messages he maintained through his presentation is that some people may not know how to help someone with mental illness or be nervous to do the wrong thing however the only wrong thing you can do is to say you don't have time. Throughout the afternoon we also heard Manitoba musicians sing about mental wellness and question and answer periods with Desiree Scott a member of the Team Canada soccer team and Eric Comrie a goaltender for the Manitoba Moose.

Students enjoyed the day and each of them had their own message from the day that really stuck with them!
