

Both Kinder classes have become "Bucket Fillers". They are paying special attention to things they can do or say to help others "fill their buckets". We read a story called, "**Have You Filled A Bucket Today? (A Guide to Daily Happiness For Kids)**". The main idea of the book is the idea that we all carry an invisible bucket that contains our feelings. When our bucket is full, we feel great. When our bucket is empty, we feel sad. A bucket filler is someone who says or does nice things for other people. By doing this, they are filling other people's buckets and filling their own bucket at the same time. On the other hand, a bucket dipper says or does things to cause other people to feel bad. A bucket dipper empties their bucket when they say and do mean things.

In March, the students were excited to perform again for festival. Each class sang two songs. They did a wonderful performance, and were very happy to see special people in the audience watching them.

GRADE ONE NEWS


The grade 4 class had a talented community artist, Mrs. Trott, come into the classroom to do African art with the students. The students worked with acrylic paints on canvas to produce a beautiful sunset scene in the safari. A tree and an African animal were accents to the paintings. A wonderful opportunity for the students!



In ELA, the students wrote paragraph's and made collages about why they were "LUCKY". This was a tribute to St. Patrick's Day. These thoughtful paragraphs adorn our hallway. Guided Reading continues in the classroom on a daily basis. Sea turtles, the Titanic, Owls, and a mini novel called Catch That Stomach round out the reading this month! We have almost finished our class novel, THE BFG by Roald Dahl.



In math, we are currently working on multiplying 3 digit by 1 digit numbers. We are working on 3 basic strategies; base ten, expanded form, and break a number apart. Students still need to continue mastering the multiplication times table up to



9x9, as it becomes more difficult to solve larger equations when they aren't familiar with the basic facts. Games on the computer, IPAD, or

flashcards are great ways to support your student at home, with mastering the times table.

In science, we have begun a new unit, HABITATS AND COMMUNITIES.



GRADE FIVE NEWS

We have had a very productive time since the last newsletter! In math we completed our unit on measurement but we found it to be a little tricky with all of the different units and remembering the difference between perimeter and area!! We then moved on to division which we found a lot easier. We've been spending a little time reviewing some previously taught concepts and taking a look at patterns as we come up to spring break.



In language arts we have been doing research projects which actually relate to our social studies. We researched things like homes, food, clothing, transportation, ceremonies and beliefs, and roles of men and women for a particular group of First Nations people. Once our research was done, we discussed how to write a good paragraph. We will also have to make a bibliography!

We have just completed our science unit on "Properties of and Changes in Substances". We did a lot of hands on experiments, and had to make sure we followed the directions. After the break we will start on our next social studies unit!



We were supposed to go to Brandon for a peer mentor celebration on March 18th, but a snow-storm changed those plans. We'll be going April 5th instead!






DAISY MARTINEZ WINS LEGION AWARD



MARIAN JUCE WINS MSBA AWARD



January, Marian Juce was selected at the Park West School Division Student Citizenship Awards as their individual submission to the Manitoba School Board Association for consideration in regional competition. Marian was then chosen as the Region 1 representative for Provincial competition. It is extremely rare for both the Individual and Group nominees to be selected from the same school division, but this year the Regional group winner was the “Hawks for Change Group” from Strathclair School, a group of five students who have worked against social injustice, locally and globally. The MSBA Banquet was held in March and Marian and the Strathclair group received their awards. Marian was also one of the six nominees for the prestigious George Harbottle

Marian Juce is a grade 12 student at Hamiota Collegiate in the Park West School Division. Although she is not a member of her school’s student council, she is an active and willing volunteer, helping out at the council-sponsored school barbeque and running the after-school canteen at school sporting events. Marian was an integral part of the school’s We Scare Hunger Campaign, and served as a liaison between the school and the local food bank, where she works as a volunteer.
