shoeing, sled rac-


es, curling, speed skating and hockey. The weather was great and it was a lot of fun.

are still working on the research part of it at this point, but after the break we will be learning how to organize our information into paragraphs.


In social studies we are looking at how the French developed New France. Many people were involved in a variety of different ways. Cardinal Richelieu created the Com-

pany of 100 Associates to help fund the project, and Jean Talon was the first one to take a census in North America. From that he learned there were more men than women and he came up with ways to change that.


> We have also just videotaped our French play which is called "L'Arbre Ungali". We used a green screen, so we're looking forward to seeing the final results.












### **Encounters With Canada**

#### Premier's Award for School Board Innovation

Four students from the PWSD were in Winnipeg on March 13, to represent the division for its Duke of Edinburgh Award Initiative at the Celebration of Success Showcase for the Premier's Award for School Board Innovation. Parks Canada (Riding Mountain National Park) and DofE MB are important partners in this initiative. The DofE programme has students in over 100 countries worldwide doing the award. The programme was started over 50 years ago by his Royal Highness The Prince Philip Duke of Edinburgh. The programme was developed to encourage personal development and community involvement for young people. PWSD has 44 students registered in the DofE programme and all students in the division 14 years of age or older can volunteer to take part in it. PWSD is the only school division in Manitoba which actively supports all of our senior high students participation in the programme. The four students who represented the division at the showcase event were Tyler Wilson, Brendan Bowley, Eveline Juce, and Jacquelyn Hawkins. These students were selected to go to Winnipeg since they are the only students in the division who have successfully completed all of the requirements for the Bronze Level of the DofE award.





#### New Water Fountains

Two new water fountains have been installed at Hamiota Collegiate. As well as operating as a regular water fountain they also allow students and staff to fill their water bottles with cold water, eliminating the need to purchase bottled water and reducing the recycling required. The installation was made possible by funds won by HCI students from Mr. Obach's Grade
