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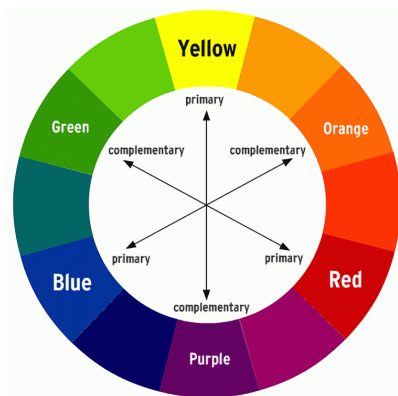
Bucket Fillers

We wrote a letter to Mr. Coulter. He helped us book a bus to go to Brandon University.



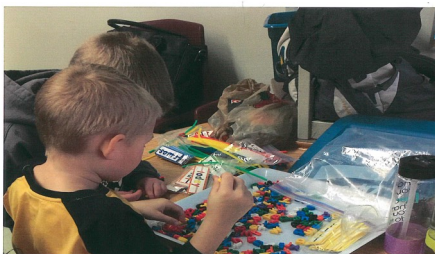
WE MADE polar bears signs to carry. We were HAVING FUN. We like DRAWING polar bears.

Grade Two News from Mrs. Gregory

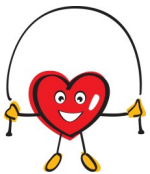
Spring has finally arrived and we are enjoying the warmer weather. The March blizzard sure made some interesting drifts in the playground and it has made playing outside an adventure.

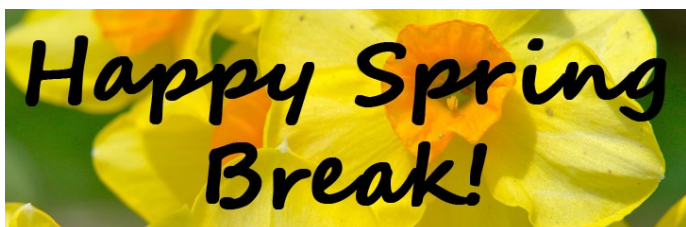

BADMINTON

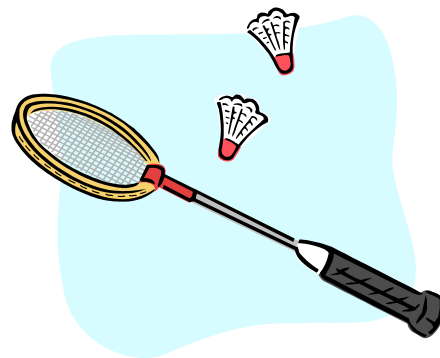
