

Understanding the building blocks of life: can proteins help improve patient outcomes?




The sessions were all very engaging. The students also were able to

NEW CRISIS LINE

A new crisis text line in now available for kids in Manitoba 24/7, every day of the year.

The service, powered by Kids Help Phone partnering with Crisis Text Line, will allow young people to reach out for help any time by text message.

The goal is to provide an easy way to access help directly from cellphones, without the need for a data plan, internet connection or app.

Kids in Manitoba can text "CONNECT" to 6-8-6-8-6-8 and will be connected to a trained crisis responder that can help with any issues.

This is the country's first and only free texting support service for youth, which will launch in other provinces across Canada later this year.

One Grade 12 student from Hamiota Collegiate Institute will be eligible for an overall award of \$6,500.00. \$1,500.00 to be awarded following proof of tuition payment for the second term. \$5,000.00 to be awarded once the individual chosen returns to the Hamiota community with one year proof of return of service in the individual's chosen area of study.

Preference will be given to a student from Hamiota Municipality whose application shows strong core values and a desire to contribute to the community of Hamiota. In addition, the student chosen will show dedication to a specific field.

250 to 500 words outlining your plans for future education and career development, as well as your intentions to return to Hamiota upon completion of school to follow a career path in your chosen field of study.

Supplementary Application Criteria:

Letter of Recommendation

Summary of Volunteer Activities

The chosen individual must obtain employment or develop their own company in the field of their chosen post-secondary education within the Hamiota community to be eligible to receive the \$5,000.00. The scholarship will be awarded at the donors' discretion.
