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KINDERGARTEN NEWS from Ms. Surovy

It is hard to believe that it is nearly time for spring break! We have been working hard in Kindergarten this month in all subject areas.



On March 18, we celebrated St. Patrick's Day in our classroom. Lucky the Leprechaun made a huge mess of our classroom and hid the goodies Ms. Surovy had prepared for all of the students. Fortunately, we have some good detectives in our class who

solved all of the clues and were able to find the pot of goodies.

Throughout the month of March, we have also been working on St. Patrick's Day themed math centres to practice our counting, subitizing, number sense, and patterning skills. We have also been working on printing and forming our numbers properly. This month, we completed a math craftivity where we created a rainbow out of Fruit Loops to practice printing our numbers, sorting our colors, and counting. Everyone had tons of fun completing this project!

We have now learned 23 letters of the alphabet! Each week we learn about a new letter, practicing how to print the letter and identifying the sound that it makes. This month we learned about letters G, S, and A. By the end of next month we will have learned all 26 letters of the alphabet! In April we will be learning about letters I, T, and J. Now that we are here every school day, we have also begun exploring our Literacy Centres twice a week and we are starting to learn how to read books in our Guided Reading groups. Students have been working hard to use picture cues to help them read pattern books and have had a lot of fun practicing letter formations in Leprechaun boogers while working at our "Word Work" centre.

We are now a month into our Home Reading Program. Students love choosing their Home Reading book at the end of the day and I am very excited to see the progress students are making in their reading. Thank-you to all of our parents for supporting this program! Please remember to log Home Reading Books that have been read in the R.E.D. (Read Every Day) section of BEAR Books each night.

This month, we have also been busy with several writing projects. At the end of February we wrote about how to be a good friend. Last week we also shared our ideas about what each student would do if they found a pot of gold. We have also been working hard to learn our Kindergarten sight words. In Social Studies, we have had an opportunity to practicing our writing and adding details to our drawings, as we work to finish our "Me Books."

Our class has also been busy learning all about the Zones of Regulation, a program that helps students learn about self-regulation and emotional control. We have had lots of fun exploring the four zones of regulation and learning about some of the characters from Disney's "Inside Out" in the process! This month, we were able to watch the movie "Inside Out" and identify the zones that some of the characters were in at different parts of the movie. Throughout the month of March, we have also focused on learning about inclusiveness. I am lucky to have such an inclusive group of students—it is rare that anyone in our class is ever left out. Next month we will be focusing on "Integrity" as our character trait of the month.

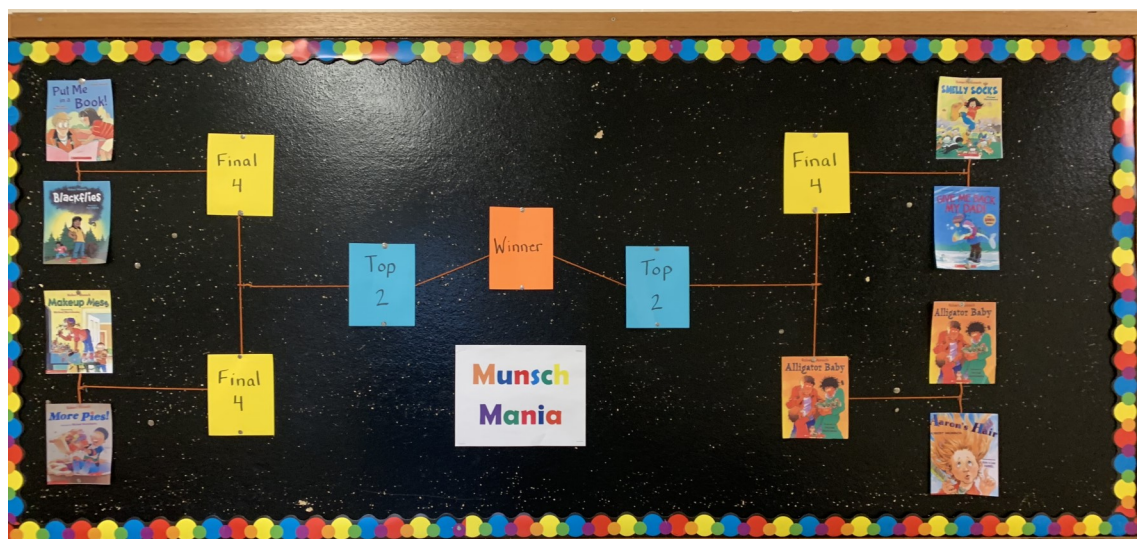
GRADE ONE NEWS from Mrs. Nowosad

The grade 2 students continue to work hard and play hard as we gear up for this much deserved spring break!

We have been working hard to develop our writing skills, learning how to use joining words, time words, and describing words to make our stories more interesting and fun to read. After each writing session, we have share chair where our developing authors have an opportunity to share their stories. We have been focusing on how to write personal narratives..... Each month, we will feature a few of our favourites:

In math we are learning how to subtract 10's and multiples of 10's from 2-digit numbers. We continue to practise adding 2-digit numbers using our mental math skills. We have also learned how to use an empty number line to help us add and subtract 2-digit numbers. In our calendar work, we are relating the number of months to a year and reading different dates. Some of our math games this month are Arrow Paths, 10's, Matching Months and All 12 Months. We continue to work on our unit on Position and Motion in science. We discussed different ways things can move and brainstormed objects that move in that way. We did a sort on objects that we can push or pull to make them move. We completed an experiment to see which ball would bounce highest. We discovered a basketball bounced highest, followed by a pickle ball and a golf ball. We also learned that the balls bounced higher on the tile floor compared to carpet.



We would also like to say a BIG congratulations to our teacher Mrs. Gregory and her rink who won the gold medal at The Masters Curling Provincials in Stonewall! We are very proud of her!

Two other members of her rink, skip Sandra Cowling and second, Wenda Turner went to school in Hamiota and lead Jeannine Skayman who was the secretary at the high school for many years.

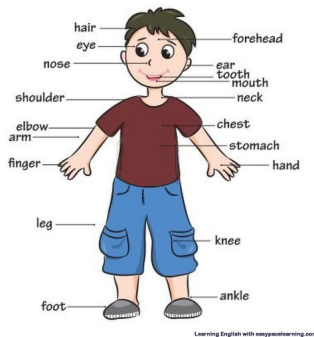
GRADE THREE NEWS from Mrs. Dixon

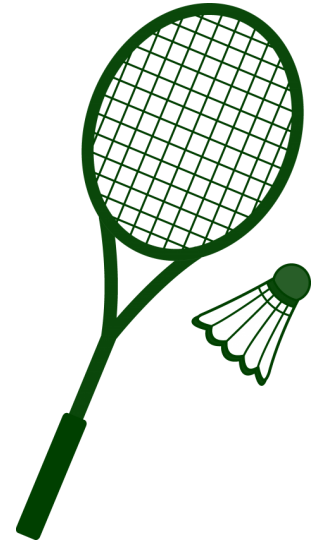

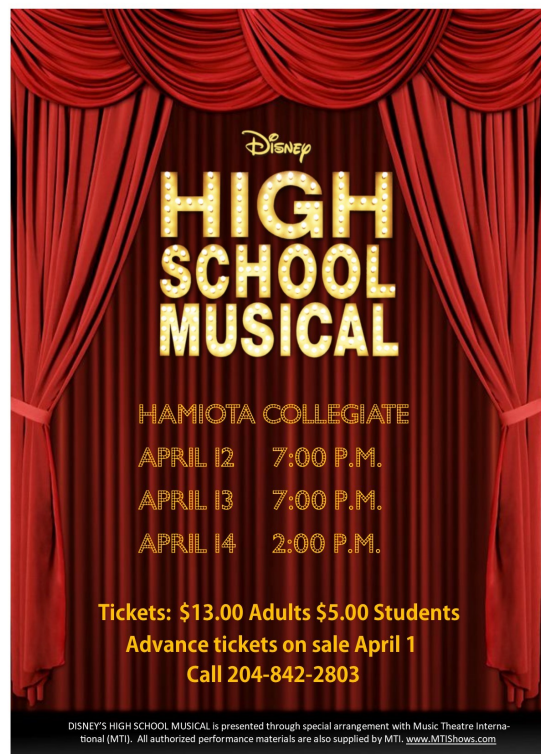


HIGH SCHOOL MUSICAL

Camryn Ramsey's 4H Speech about Career Trek

In eight days I attended two colleges and one university. How, do you ask? I participated in the Career Trek program 2018-2019. Career Trek is a program run out of Brandon University and both ACC's. In this program you learn a lot about different careers and get to do an activity associated with these careers.

The careers that we did at ACC North Hill were pastry chef, carpentry, education and police studies. Out of these careers my favourite was pastry chef, as we got to learn how to make pizza. For lunch that day I had a Canadian pizza that I made myself. You should have seen the kitchen there, this wasn't any kitchen, it was amazing there were three kitchens for three types of food. Hot foods, cold foods and a bakery. My least favourite was carpentry because I smacked my thumb with a hammer, and my shelf fell apart.

At Brandon University we did three parts of science, Biology, medicine and chemistry. We also did anthropology, indigenous studies, gym and band teachers. Some of the fun and interesting activities we did were making elephant toothpaste, dissect a sheep's eyeball and extract strawberry DNA. Elephant toothpaste is an experiment where you combine soap and water in a beaker. Then you mix yeast and water, let it sit for five minutes, pour it in, and it explodes into a foamy mess. To extract strawberry DNA you need to blend strawberries, salt and soap, filter it and pour it into rubbing alcohol then you can see the little strings of DNA.

At ACC on Victoria Avenue we did video game designer, graphic designer, business, freshwater ecologist, water quality technician, nursing and personal fitness trainer. Water quality technician was fun because we got to build a wetland in a cup. We got to use sand, gravel, rocks, cotton balls and wood chips and then we decided how to layer them in the cup to create the best filter for dirty water. It still looked pretty murky to me even after we had filtered the dirty water. I enjoyed this because we got to see how wetlands work and create our own.

Throughout the eight weeks there were two family days, so our families got to experience the jobs as well. I was able to take my mom to BU and my dad to ACC on Victoria Avenue so they were able to spend the day with me and see what Career Trek was all about.

I have finished all the career trek days and all that is left is my graduation at Westman Centennial Auditorium on March 9th. I learned about lots of careers at Career Trek, but now I have to wait seven years until I graduate from high school and decide if I want to pursue one of these careers, but I'm sure there will be lots of different and new careers by 2025.

HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY

On March 18th, 2019 the Huskies ended the season in winning fashion with a “W” over the Dauphin Clippers at the Credit Union Place. This game completed the final series sweep to become the 2019 WHSHL Champions. The boys worked extremely hard over the course of the season to end with 37 Wins and 4 Losses. The regular season saw the team score 148 times and only allowed 38 goals against.

This season the Huskies were also eligible to compete in the provincial qualifier, now being a 4 school co-op. We started with a game against Boissevain on a February Friday night which took 19 seconds into double overtime to win 4-3. We advanced to play Major Pratt in the final and then onto provincials in Cartwright on March 7th, 8th, and 9th. The provincial draw was short, with only 6 teams and we were placed in a pool with none other than Major Pratt. We beat Major Pratt 6-0 and then when on to beat Pembina Hills 5-3. Finishing first in our pool advanced us to the semi-final which matched us up against Killarney/Wawanesa. We came out of this game with a “W” advancing to the final against Morris/St. Jean Baptist/St. Pierre. The final game was not very hard hitting but a very fast Morris team handed us our fourth “L” of the season as we fell 4-1 (1 goal in an empty net). Even though we did lose this game we still came home with a silver medal and the first ever hockey banner to hang at HCI.

The season concluded with league playoffs. First round had us matched up the Rivers-Elton Rage, which the boys won with a sweep. Next up, Major Pratt again. This series took 3 games but the Huskies came out on top. The league final saw us meet up with Dauphin, who early in the season handed us our first league loss. The boys were eager for a rematch and played with determination and hunger. With a 4-2 and 3-0 wins over the Clippers, the Hamiota Huskies become the 2018-19 Westman High School Hockey League Champions. It was an amazing season with great guidance from the coaches and support from the parents and fans. We would like to both congratulate the grade 12 players on their final season as a Husky and wish them well in their future endeavors. We look forward to fall and the next hockey season.
