


Celebration of Learning and are now doing a novel study and working on writing fiction stories in LA. We are also trying out a new spelling program called "Words Their Way" which involves



Mr. Crampain's Business Classes Standout At 'Capturing Opportunities'!

On April 23th and 24th, our Business classes were fortunate enough to have 2 separate teams qualify for competitions at Capturing Opportunities. The Grade 10 & 11 students attended a business simulation game called the Executive Challenge. The Grade 10 students attended a business plan competition called the Entrepreneurship Elimination. Read on for the excellent standings!

Executive Challenge –aka. Grand Challenge

The Manitoba Chamber of Commerce and the Youth Business Institute in assistance with the Red River College conduct a business game called the Executive Challenge; this business game uses a computer simulation. Schools from across Manitoba compete in this grueling business game of Management and Accounting skills. The teams are given 6 million dollars to begin their venture and have to decide on 9 different areas, ranging from Pricing and Marketing to Production and Inventory, to make decisions within their business, thus bringing the highest return on investment possible (ROI). Over the course of the semester 10 decisions were made with multiple teams losing their investment and ending up bankrupt. Within the game all real life situations are included such as bank interest, taxes and company competition. Students at HCl competed in this game, along with multiple teams from around the province, and placed high enough in the competition to be invited to the Grand Challenge at Capturing Opportunities. In order to play at the Grand Challenge a team must be in the top returns in Manitoba. Our team from Hamiota consisted of Shelby Medd, Holly Campbell, Emilio Montenegro, and James Thomson who placed 2nd achieving a cash prize of \$500.00 at this year's Grand Challenge - Way to go team! Just qualifying for the Grand Challenge is a huge accomplishment!

Attending the Grand Challenge also qualified Hamiota Collegiate for a \$500 "matching" bursary from the MB Chamber of Commerce. The matching part means that if the bursary recipient is attending a Manitoba College or University the corresponding school also gives \$500 towards tuition, thus making a total value of \$1000.

This year the Junior Achievement of Manitoba (JA) created a competition for Grade 10 students to present their business plan from the Start Your Own Business class (SYOB) at Capturing Opportunities. In this class at HCI we discuss various aspects about becoming an Entrepreneur as well as study the 10 steps to an effective business plan. Using the Student Venture booklet provid-

This year a group from the Start Your Own Business class was also invited to the Capturing Opportunities' Entrepreneur Elimination competition with large amounts of prize money awarded to the winning schools. Our team went into Brandon to present their Woody Stich'n business. This plan was presented in front of four prominent judges ranging from various aspects of the real life business field. Our team consisted of Shavna Mathison and Blaine Lee. Our school was very well represented but unfortunately did not achieve a cash prize this year around. Excellent job team!


