


GRADE FIVE NEWS

We have been very busy in all subject areas. In math we are just wrapping up our fractions and decimals unit. We spent lots of time on equivalent fractions, but we've also learned how to change fractions to decimals, and what they mean, as well as comparing and ordering fractions, how to add and subtract decimals, and relating fractions to division.


