Principals' Message for May 2019

Looking back at the past month I am so impressed with all that has taken place. Our staff and students continue to work hard at the traditional aspect of education. As I wander through classrooms I am amazed at all of the different projects and learning that is taking place. Our students have grown so much over the course of the year.

Some highlights from our schools this past month include varsity badminton provincials, where 10 of our athletes from HCI participated and represented our school admirably. Five of our varsity athletes made the trek to Thompson for the varsity badminton provincials while five junior varsity athletes went to Winkler. Middle years' soccer has been at the forefront of sports this month for our middle years' students. HCI has a coed team playing in the PWSD soccer league this month and they have been steadily improving as they prepare for the divisional final tournament on May 30. At the elementary school, the annual Soccer Jamboree took place on Friday, May 17 with teams from Strathclair and Shoal Lake joining our teams for some fun. bands from Shoal Lake and Strathclair on a band trip to Regina. Congratulations to our Jazz Band earning a gold medal for their performance. Finally, Mrs. Dixon's grade three class made their final visit to Lilac Residence this past month to wrap up another successful year of relationship building between some of the oldest and youngest citizens in our community.

For a number of years now, members of the HCI student body and a number of staff members have been initiating a fundraising effort to support some organization, either locally or nationally. This year the group organized a supper and variety show to raise funds for the Cathy-Jo Growing Minds Reading Room at HES. The proceeds from the evening will be used by the school to replace the existing sunroom attached to the library at the school. I personally want to thank our fundraising committee for selecting our project to help out. Thank you to everyone who supported this event which raised over \$15,000.00.

At the beginning of May we had an Alphabet Party to celebrate learning all of the letters of the alphabet. Students enjoyed eating Alphabet Cereal and searching for all of the Letterland characters out on the playground. On May 8, we also celebrated our 100th Day of Kindergarten! We spent the whole day working through several activities that involved the number 100, including making 100 Day Crowns, writing about what we will look like and like to do when we are 100, making a craft of what we will look like when we are 100, and sorting several different snacks into 10 groups of 10 to make a "100 Day Snack Mix!"



Even with two important celebrations this month, the most exciting thing that has happened in our room this month is the beginning of our integrated thematic unit on "Dinosaurs!" Students are thrilled to be learning about this topic and have made a list of questions about dinosaurs that we will work to answer in preparation for a visit from a Paleontologist at the beginning of



June. We would like to know:

Dinosaurs that lived in the water or flew in the air aren't actually dinosaurs-- they are prehistoric sea creatures and flying lizards!) and we will be exploring answers to the rest of these questions over the next few weeks!

We concluded our science unit on Position and Motion by planning and designing a toy truck. We had fun creating some great looking vehicles. Grade 4 Classroom News - Mrs. L. Routledge

It is hard to believe that the last leg of our year is upon us! June will be filled with fun activities, field trips, swimming, and of course wrapping up our year of learning in Grade 4. Keep your eyes peeled for a field trip note coming home soon!



May has been a busy month! We have completed our Bigfoot unit in ELA and finished it off with a Reader's Theatre entitled, "Bigfoot Cinderella". The Grade 4's performed for the Grade 1, 2, and 3 classes. It was enjoyed by all. We continue to work on self-editing and proofreading practice in our writing journals.

Our fractions and decimals unit has been a long one! Lots of new concepts to explore and become familiar with! Weekly review of multiplication facts, addition and subtraction, and problem solving are ongoing. CNP's will be completed during class time for the month of June.

Habitats and Communities has been our focus in May. Students are researching and compiling lists of habitats and the animals that dwell there. Many comparisons have been made between our last S.S. unit, Canada's Far North and our present unit. The students are already familiar with the Arctic tundra habitat and have been excited to use their prior knowledge and apply it to our learning in science.

Grade 5 from Mrs. Routledge

The year is rapidly coming to an end! I feel like I just did a newsletter item, and here it is time again!

We have just wrapped up our fractions and decimals unit in math, and plan to spend the next few weeks learning some geometry. We will be doing this around the year end math assessment which focuses on the concept of number - place value, estimating, problem solving, multiplication, fractions, decimals, etc. The geometry unit always offers some challenges because of the new vocabulary that is introduced. It is hard to remember the difference between parallel and perpendicular, for example, or rhombus, trapezoid, and quadrilateral!

In language arts we are working on persuasive writing. Everyone is trying to convince someone of something - living in the country is better than living in the city, one hockey team is better than another, why we need to recycle, why we should get our pets from a pound, and even why someone should be allowed to get a kitten. We are also still working on the novel Mrs. Frisby and the Rats of NIMH. Sometimes we read, and sometimes we listen to it being read. We continue to work on vocabulary as we read.

In science we are studying the human body. We are learning about different systems in our body - digestive, circulatory, respiratory, skeletal and muscular for example. We are also learning about good nutrition and what sorts of things we can do to keep our bodies healthy. This unit always involves much sharing!

Besides the regular academics, there will also be many days the grade fives will be out of the school for other events - field trips, track, orientation at the high school and so on. Hopefully parents of grade five students received a letter earlier this week with details about each of these events. There should also have been a permission form attached which needs to be returned. Happy June, everyone!

The Grade 5's have been working on a unit of the different band instruments that are available to them next year in band. Husky Hot Lunch

Our product/service is planning and making hot lunches for the elementary school students. We are going to be serving one hot lunch for the next four weeks on Wednesdays. We will save parents time because we will be quick access in the school as we are setting up right in the lobby. All the money profited is going right back into the business and then at the end of the four weeks the money will be paid back to all investors. We project that we will make about \$75 each sale and we are going to have three sales so we project that we will make a total of \$300 for our business after expenses and with investors paid back. Each group member will also be keeping track of his or hers hours so we can pay each other minimum wage. Our business is to relieve the stress of parents' lives with our tasty and delicious hot lunches.



The Sweet Shop



The Sweet Shop bakes different types of homemade baked goods and also sells hot beverages. Our products will be homemade and packaged as well as delivered to our customers. Our baked goods will differentiate from other groups and the bakery because we deliver our goods to people and we also sell hot beverages. The bakery doesn't deliver their goods to people, people have to go to the bakery and buy the goods. Our hot beverages and baked goods will vary in price depending on the cost of ingredients. We estimate that our baked goods will sell for around \$10-\$15 depending on the cost of ingredients.

Our estimated amount of money we will spend is around \$150. Weather conditions will affect our delivering of the baked goods for example: if it rains or snows we would have to walk in the rain and snow, or the cold weather, and if it is hot outside the chances of our baked goods melting is extremely high as well as spoil faster. We are currently looking for around \$150 to purchase the ingredients for our baked goods and beverages. As of right now every member in our group is going to pitch in \$15 to try and start up our business.

Our business idea is to sell milkshakes and cookies in the canteen. We differ from the competition by having days where you make your own milkshake, the other competitors don't have custom milkshakes. The people responsible for our business is Kyla, Machaela, Ryan, Kyler, Jacob and Lorenz. We are each investing 20\$ into the business for startup capital. We will be looking for ingredients that are on sale so that we can spend the least amount possible. We will be sure to be responsible with our money.

Our business will be providing a car cleaning service for both cars and farm equipment. Our name is the Soapy Six. We will be using soap and water to wash the outside of vehicles, and cloths and Windex for cleaning the inside of the vehicle. We will be competing with TJ's car wash. The difference between our business and TJ's is that we will be washing our customer's cars, but at TJ's they have to wash their own car. We chose to do a car washing company because we have a very hard working group which is needed for washing cars. We also thought washing cars would be a good business because there's not many in the area, so we will attract more customers. The Huskies lost to Russell in the Zone 10 playoffs, so did not move on to provincial qualifying play.

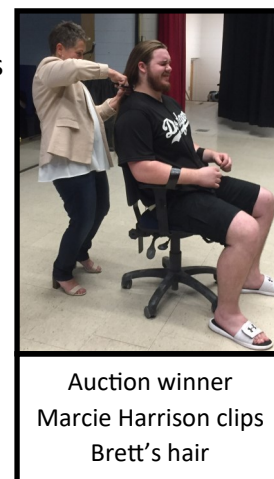
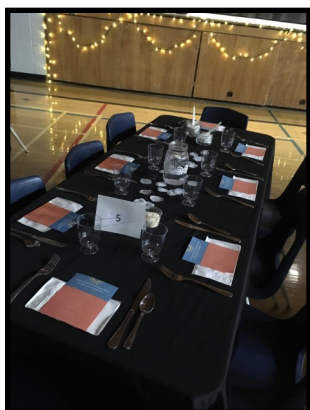
Cathy-Jo Harrison Growing Minds Reading Room Fundraiser a Great Success!!

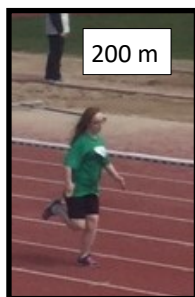

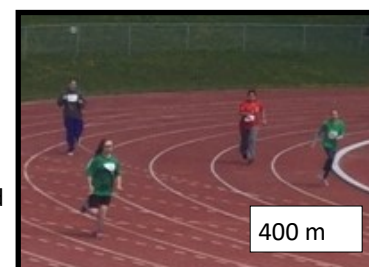
Mikayla Grabowski Medals at SOM

Mikayla Grabowski competed in the 2019 Special Olympics of Manitoba Track and Field Competition on May 25th. Mikayla is a member of the Russell Athletics of the Parkland Regional team. This is her third year competing in SOM Track and Field and she continues to grow with the challenge presented each year. This year's event was an open competition with competitors coming from the Interlake, Portage La Prairie, Warren, Morden and many clubs in Winnipeg.

Mikayla continues to participate in the 100 m, 200m, Shot Put and Standing Long Jump as her events of choice. A determined competitor, Mikayla was successful in her events as she earned 2 - First place and 2 - Second place finishes in her events. Mikayla placed First in her Shot Put and Long Jump division and placed Second in the 100m and 200m competition.



A uniqueness to Special Olympic competition is the determination of division.
