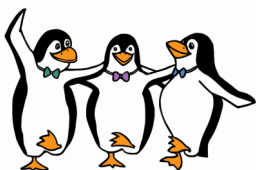

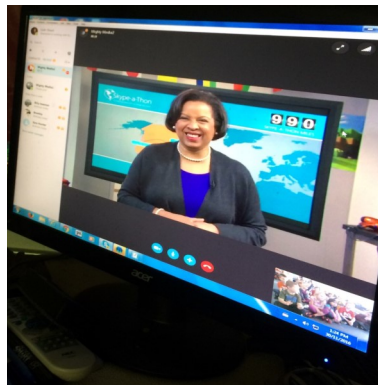

In Social Studies we have started working on a unit about our community. We have located our province and town on a map of Canada.

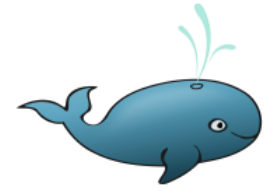

GRADE FOUR NEWS from Mrs. Routledge

Welcome to December! Can you believe it's here already? We are anticipating a very busy, very festive month in Grade 4R!

Math - We have just started Unit #2-Multiplication and Division. The students are busy learning and practicing a variety of strategies to help them learn their times tables. Doubling, skip counting, using arrays, finding patterns, and using base ten blocks are all strategies we are going to be working on to help us multiply. Any time the students can practice with flash cards at home will help them memorize their facts! A deck of cards is always helpful if you don't have flash cards at home.



ELA - Guided Reading is ongoing in Grade 4 and we have also just started reading *Oliver Twist* by Charles Dickens. Home Reading will continue on throughout December so please make sure to initial your child's agenda each morning. Your child will be working on these skills when reading aloud at home and school; reading smoothly in larger phrases, pausing appropriately for punctuation, using expression when reading dialogue, and self-correcting.

Science- We have begun to "rock n' roll" in Grade 4 science! Rocks and Minerals are on our minds these days. We are learning the difference between rocks and minerals, as well as the three types of rocks; igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic. Soon your child will be able to explain the difference between these types of rocks.



Christmas Concert- It's hard to believe that the holiday season is upon us already. Thank-you to the parents who were able to send in reindeer antlers for the Grade 4 students. A note will be coming home with more information about costumes and clothing.

Christmas Mug Exchange - The Grade 4R's brought home a note about our classroom gift exchange this week. 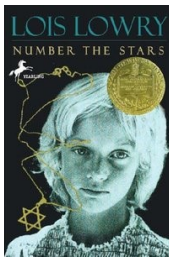


GRADE FIVE NEWS from Mrs. Routledge

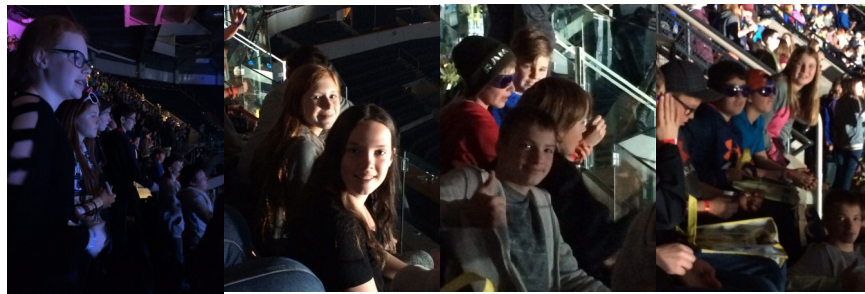
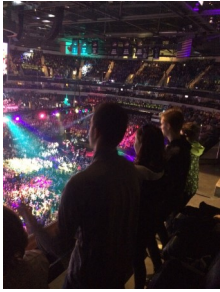

The four recipients were announced in Ottawa on Nov. 3 and were chosen from qualified applicants from all over Canada.

Eveline was recognized in the area of the Environment & Healthy Living as an outstanding 4-H'er who epitomizes 4-H youth empowerment. The program believes it's important to acknowledge and honour confident, accomplished 4-H'ers who have gained critical life skills through their 4-H experience. The recipients demonstrate Personal Impact, Community Impact and Leadership Excellence.

Eveline has been an active 4-H member of the Decker Country Riders for 10 years. She has been on the executive council of her 4-H club for seven years and has sat as treasurer on Manitoba's South Parkland Area 4-H Council. When Eveline is not busy with 4-H, she is actively involved in sports and in her community. Eveline sits on the Hamiota Age Friendly Board, has completed the gold level requirements for the Duke of Edinburgh Program, sat on the National Duke of Edinburgh Youth Advisory board for two years as a delegate and is junior light horse director of Hamiota's light horse show. Her passion is riding her horses year round and competing on the Manitoba Gymkhana Rodeo Association circuit. ENCOUNTERS WITH CANADA

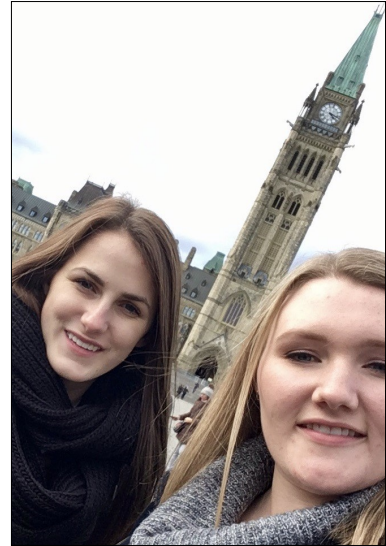

After that we spent an amazing hour with a veteran, my veteran was Mr. Pierce who was a driver for different captains. He has post-traumatic stress. He has a working dog named Vector who aids him in his depression. After that hour, we had a war time lunch which was mashed potatoes, beans, meatloaf and bread pudding. It was good. It showed us how they rationed their food during the war. On Thursday we were taken to a ballet at a theater. We saw the classic Giselle. It was quite enjoyable. The orchestra was really good. They even had a harp. On Friday I attended the National Remembrance Service in Ottawa. It was cold but well worth it. I was very moved by what the armed services had done for our country. After the service we went back to the center for another speaker who told us of his experiences in the war. Award Criteria

Park West School Division recognizes students from our schools who demonstrate their commitment to the values of citizenship through activities such as:

Application Procedures

A Park West School Division student, staff, or community member is invited to nominate a student and/or group for these awards. [Please contact your school principal to make them aware of your intention to make a nomination.](#) A nomination must take the form of a complete application, as follows:

Student Application

- completed application form (including activity summary page)
- an essay (maximum 500 words) from the student or group that defines what citizenship means to them, and/or describes how the student or group has tried to live out the concept of good citizenship in school and community

Two Sponsoring Letters as follows:

- A letter from an **official at the student's or group's school** that:
 - describes the context in which the sponsoring official has known or worked with the student or group
 - describes how the student's or group's actions at school demonstrate good citizenship
- A letter from a **representative of a community organization** that:
 - indicates the individual's relationship with the student or group
 - describes how the student's or group's actions in the community demonstrate good citizenship

Please submit applications no later than noon on January 13th, 2017 to your local school office – applications must be complete and received on time to be considered. All applications will be forwarded to the Division Office.
