Our middle years' volleyball program saw the grade 6's participate in several practices before travelling to Miniota for some game action. Wow, November has really flown by for us. This month we have been learning about Peace and Kindness. We brainstormed what it feels like for us when we are peaceful. We came up with some ideas like: calm, happy, good, relaxed. Then, we discussed what made us think of peace and what peace meant to us. After we letters and sounds through had our ideas we each illustrated what peace meant to us and then we created a movie to share our learning.

In Math we have started Math Stations. We now have chocolate stand. We also four stations up and running: Math at my Seat, Math Games, Math with Technology and Math with the Teacher. Everyone is becoming more independent and working well while I work with a small group of students at the teacher table. We are working on counting to ten, subitizing a dice, and printing the numbers.

We have continued working hard at learning letters and their sounds. We are each taking a letter bag home each night to learn the letter's name and sound as well as draw a picture in our personal letter book of something that starts with that sound. We are going to continue to work on our a variety of Christmas play-based activities over the next month.

Our playhouse has been transformed into Santa's Workshop and a hot have a tree to decorate in the upstairs playhouse, and some Christmas crafts at our Art station. We don't have many Kindergarten days left until Christmas so we plan on reading lots of stories, playing some Christmas Math & ELA games and doing some Christmas Art.



KINDERGARTEN B - MS. CARRIE RAMSEY

We have been busy in Kindergarten this month learning about our different emotions and how to manage all these big emotions. We used the movie Inside Out to guide our discussions about each emotion and help us understand that all our feelings are okay. It's how we handle them that matters. Letterland is an exciting part of our morning routine, when we get to meet a new Letterland Character, we build the letter, learn a song/ dance and practice printing each letter. November was the beginning of our math stations. Hard work is being done each day to

write sentences in our draw and write book and to add a beautifully detailed picture. We have learned several sight words so far and use them in our daily writing. Each station is a hands-on game or activity working on number recognition and building on numeracy skills. Math stations also teaches us to share and to work together to play games or complete a task. As we move into December our dramatic play area magically changed into Santa's workshop and has a Hot Chocolate stand to keep us busy and using our imaginations.

GRADE ONE-MRS. NOWOSAD

It is hard to believe that November is almost over. We have been fortunate with some pretty lovely weather overall this month. Some of our kids are excited to be able to slide on the little hill at school, and lots of snow people/balls can be found on our playground.

We continue working on our guided reading groups, and it's great to see the progress these kids are making. We have been focusing a lot on building strong phonological awareness skills, and using these skills to help with reading and writing (spelling). Lots of oral activities and I am sincerely in awe of how well these kids are able to manipulate sounds, syllables etc in words already. Journal writing continues as well.

In math, we have been working with larger numbers, up to 100. We have practiced

sequencing, comparing, and identifying these larger numbers. A favourite activity we do involves me blacking out a hundreds chart on the smartboard. Then I give a student a number to "find" or uncover. Using their knowledge of patterns and placements of numbers on the hundreds chart, they try to find it. They are getting very good at this activity! We have mastered skip counting by 10's, and 5's will be next. We have introduced more math games and math puzzles.

Science has us working on our Five Senses unit. It's been fun listening to different sounds, trying to identify what makes that particular sound. We also have been using our sense of sight to try to identify close up photos of various objects. Next we will have some fun learning about our sense of touch, taste and smell.



We are grateful to have some wonderful volunteers helping out again this year. Thanks to Mrs. Sheridan, Mrs. Brooks and Mrs. Lee for coming to listen to is read each week. We really appreciate it.

It was great to connect with many of my Grade 1 families this month so we could share all the wonderful learning each child has done this year. I look forward to when we can do this in person again.

We are looking forward to December and the fun the Christmas season can bring to our learning at school.

In math, students have been learning different strategies to recall basic facts, while earning gumball stickers for their gumball machines! Problem solving is also a big part of our math program and the students used their creativity to write their own problems for their peers to solve. Here are 3 to share:

We have continued our exploration of the states of matter by performing many investigations. The students have a lot of fun making hypotheses, an important part of the investigating process.

In Math, we are working on many strategies for addition. We're discovering that knowing our basic facts to 18 is a big help when working with 2 and 3 digit numbers. We also enjoyed making some number riddles to share daily with our classmates. This group works very cooperatively when playing games and completing problem solving activities! Keep up the great work, Grade 3!

In Science, even though we've completed our plants unit, we are still growing plants of our own. Currently, we are growing lettuce and have transplanted it already. With the help of our grow light, we hope to be able to have a fresh salad one of these days. Many learning activities that go with thanks to Mrs. Johns for securing the grant from the "Agriculture in the Classroom" program. The materials we received are very helpful for our cause!

We've now started a unit on forces, such as magnetism. There are many fun and meaningful experiments in this unit, so we're looking forward to some great learning over the next few weeks.

Soon it will be time to think of Christmas and all the fun the season!







GRADE 4 NEWS—MRS. ROUTLEDGE

The holiday season is quickly approaching and things are starting to feel festive in Grade 5! With Report Cards and Parent Teacher Interviews in the past, we are looking forward to squeezing in a little bit more learning before Christmas holidays. Although we won't be able to have our Christmas concert this year, we are looking forward to decking the halls and bringing some Christmas cheer and spirit to HES in the coming weeks!

November was a busy month in our classroom. We started our novel study for "Number the Stars," finished up our math unit on fractions, and created and tested catapults in science. We were also excited to welcome two hermit crabs into our classroom: Karl and Mr. Crabs! We learned very quickly that hermit crabs molt, and have been patiently waiting for Karl to finish growing his new exoskeleton. The process of molting can take up to 3 months for hermit crabs. We've spent some time learning about hermit crabs this month so that we can take care of them properly. Here are some of the interesting facts that we have learned about hermit crabs:

- Hermit crabs are mainly nocturnal
- •They like to climb
- They can see colour and can see 360* around them
- •The usually live in tropical places so they like heat and humidity
- •They drink out of a sponge. Putting a sponge in their environment also helps to maintain proper humidity.
- •They need two sources of water: saltwater and freshwater.
- •There are over 800 known species of hermit crabs. The largest is the coconut crab.
- •Despite their name, hermit crabs are social creatures.

The last couple months have been wonderful in the music world and the students have been making great progress and have demonstrated a genuine interest and enthusiasm for making music. It has been truly inspiring for their teacher!

In Grade 6, we are wrapping up our chair drumming unit. We have been concentrating on sixteenth notes and I have heard amazing progress on their part and they have been extremely successful. Bravo Students! Going forward we are going to wrap up our Bucket Drumming in December and then we are going to start doing a unit on Body Percussion.

The Grade 7 students have continued to work on their fundamentals and being able to play with a proper tone. All the students have been put in a lot of work and the benefits are starting to show. We are just about at the point of learning the first six notes on our instrument and then we will be able to start playing our very first band piece! I can't wait!

In Grade 8 they have continued to work on their fundamentals and they have been working on a few pop songs that only use three notes. The students have become extremely proficient at these and they have increased their ability to read notes and to play with a great tone. Going forward we are going to begin looking at a Pentatonic Scale and we are going to continue to learn some new Band music.

The Senior students have been working on many Band concepts and skills and each time I hear them play they are playing better and better. We have been working on two songs "Crusade" by Vince Gassi and "African Festival" by Quincy Hilliard. We have also just started on "20 Carols in Two Minutes" which the students have enjoyed and have been able to learn very quickly.


GRADE 6
