
Another fun learning experience was our walking field trip to our Fire Hall. With the help of our local firefighters, Chrystal Strachan, Josh Cur-

It has been a busy last few weeks in grade 1! We have started our guided reading groups, and I really enjoy this chance to listen to students read in small groups. While I am working with my group of students, the others are working independently or with a partner at different center activities. These might include spelling or sight word activities, journals or writing. We work daily on practicing to read and write our sight words too. Students have been trying hard to produce 5 Star writing - which includes using upper case letters at the beginning of

sentences, punctuation at the ends of sentences, finger spaces, neat printing (making tall letters tall, short letters short, etc) and making sure the sentences make sense! I am really pleased with how hard this group is working on this! Great job Grade 1s!

In art, students have made beautiful torn paper owls, these turned out really well! They also were given a choice to create either a scarecrow or Frankenstein. Then they were to write some interesting facts about this character.

We have also been busy working on All About Me booklets. It's neat to learn different things about each other and see how we are the same and different.



In math we have spent a lot of time working with patterns. Students can create, label and extend different types of patterns, using a variety of materials. We are working on reading and writing numbers to 100, before and after, as well as different ways to represent numbers. We have also started to work on different ways to make 10.

With Halloween fast approaching, we have been working on some fun activities in both math and ELA. Students are super excited to write about how they would dress up Mr. Coulter for Halloween! They also wrote about Halloween using their five senses.

As October winds down, we start looking forward to taking part in Remembrance Day activities.




GRADE THREE NEWS FROM MRS. DIXON

GRADE FIVE NEWS FROM MRS. SCHETTLER

It's Global Read Aloud this month! ELA has been full of war, deserts and water as we read A Long Walk to Water. We have been following Salva across South





ern Sudan in search of his family. Each week students get to write their chapter summaries using the Padlet app and work on creating thoughtful and specific questions. We have also been skyping our Global Read Aloud partners from Webb City, Missouri each week! It has been a blast getting to learn about life in the USA while talking about the book.

We are also about to begin TUSC so remember to practice your speeches!

In math students are currently practicing their times tables using their math belts. Students are trying to recall all the facts up to 12x12.

In science we are still exploring different simple machines such as gears, screws, wedges and inclined planes. Students have been using Wacky Factory to cre-

ate different gears with partners and exploring ways to make things

move.

Social studies has been full of animals as we looked at the 7 sacred teachings. We even did some yoga to help us remember all the animals. The students also created animal art inspired by aboriginal artist. Enjoy the rest of fall!



Happy fall everyone! October has been a busy month, and has flown by rather quickly!

We wrapped up our Whole Numbers unit in math, and have had a good start on our multiplication unit. Just a gentle reminder that any practicing of facts would be greatly appreciated. I know hockey and dance have started, but in the car on the way there or on your way home would be a great place to practice. We have discussed and practiced estimating products, and will be starting our mental math strategies in the next day or so.





In language arts, we have been working on a novel called "Number the Stars". This is a historical fiction novel that takes place during WWII. We have been reading independently, discussing our reading, and responding to questions in our Reader's Notebook. We have also been doing some research on WWII, Adolf Hitler, De Frie Danske, and the Tivoli Gardens. On top of this, we have been doing some creative writing. We are trying to incorporate many things such as adjectives and adverbs, similes, and quotation marks.

We have just wrapped up our science unit on simple machines, and are beginning a social studies unit on Canada's First Peoples.
