

## **Grade One News from Mrs. Nowosad**

We have continued to be very busy in grade one. We are glad to see the sun again, but we need to remember to bring extra mitts and toques as well as warmer clothes.



October seems to have been a hectic month with assessment, Halloween, Roots of Empathy and lots of different activities to keep us busy. Our school wide character trait for October was respect. I love the bulletin board our students created showing different ways they could be respectful at school. We have had lots of excellent discussions on this topic and I am very proud of all the ideas my students have come up with.

In language arts we continue to be busy with our reading groups, practicing our writing, our printing and learning many, many sight words and spelling words. We had fun with our writing as we decided how we would like to dress up Mr. Coulter for Halloween. We have also been learning about spiders and bats.

In math we continue to work with patterns. It has been fun to get out all the manipulatives and build patterns all around our classroom. We are also working on identifying numbers to one hundred as well as one or two big-

Set and one or two smaller than a given number. Ordering numbers from biggest to smallest can be tricky with larger numbers. We have also been

working on a variety of ways to represent different numbers.

In science we have started our unit on the five senses. We listen to various sounds and try to identify what we heard. Not always as easy as it sounds. Then we made popcorn and were able to use all five of our senses during this process, with a nice tasty treat in the end. We have also done some writing with our five senses and Halloween.



We were excited to have Mrs. Whelpton and baby Harlan visit our classroom again this month. The kids were very excited to see how much she has grown and changed. We are already looking forward to when she visits us next month.

We sure had some excited kids for Halloween. I really enjoyed seeing all of their costumes and the excitement this day brings.



### Grade Two News from Mrs. Gregory & Mrs. McNabb

It is hard to believe another month has flown by. The grade 2 classroom continues to be a very busy place.

We continue to practice our reading and writing daily. The students have written paragraphs about their favourite season, learning how to use engaging, opening sentences and strong ending sentences. Reading non-fiction texts about bats and collecting facts about these flying mammals has led these kids to write some detailed informational paragraphs.

In social studies, we have been focusing on character education.....how our school and local community work together. We have started "Problem Solving Buddies." Each student belongs to a problem-solving buddy group. We are learning how to be independent problem solvers. Can we solve our own problems before we ask a teacher for help? When a peer conflict arises in the classroom or on the playground, we practice the steps below. Lots of role-playing is helping us to learn how to make safe and wise choices independently.

- 1. Find your buddy. Tell them your problem.
- 2. Pick 3 solutions.
- Which one are you going to try?

The goal is that learning these important decision making steps will lead to an even more peaceful school community.

In math we have been working on problem solving by doing a problem of the day each morning. We have been learning about odd and even numbers as well as ordinal numbers. We practiced using ordinal numbers in our Halloween concentration game. We have also been working on doubles and near doubles. We have been practicing counting by 1's, 5's and 10's using money.

We were able to observe the complete metamorphoses of our mealworms in science class. It was so exciting to see the larva, pupa and adult beetle stages of their life cycle. We also had lots of fun making bird nests out of items such as clay, grass, twigs, feathers and other items from nature. We have some very interesting looking nests on display in the hallway so check them out if you are in the school.











## **Grade Three News from Mrs. Dixon**

October has certainly provided us with a variety of weather, hasn't it? We braved the slushy, snowy Walk For Terry on Friday, October 5<sup>th</sup>! Even though the conditions were less than ideal, we enjoyed walking with our Grade 8 buddies, as we had previously met to make posters and banners with them. It's great to make connections with the older students and it was all for a most worthy cause.





We have been reading and writing some fun and interesting Halloween stories this month. This group really enjoyed the Halloween "roll a story" activity, as they wrote some very creative plots! They also kept me guessing what their Halloween costumes would be, as they wrote clues for me. We are trying to use our editing skills when writing stories and this will continue throughout the year. Our home reading program has been a "reading spell" and many of us have completed it or read beyond – way to go, Grade 3!

We are finishing up our unit about plants in Science and have learned some valuable facts about them. We had a guest artist, Mrs. Rawlings, come to teach us how to do seed art. Great creations were made!

Our school character theme this month has been "respect." We worked in partners to think about what respect feels like, looks like and sounds like. This is an ongoing life lesson and it's important to practice these skills for good citizenship!



We are working hard in class; I'm pleased with our efforts and enthusiasm for learning! We enjoyed our Halloween activities and our looking forward to our Lilac Buddy program, which will begin later in November!

### **Grade Four News from Mrs. L. Routledge**

October has been a busy month in Grade 4! The days are full and seem to be flying by...

Reading, writing, art, math, music, and social studies have been filling our days...but so have some very important words...CARING and RESPECT! These words are part of our Character Education each month at HES and we have been trying hard each day to be caring and respectful students!

In ELA, we have been reading and writing up a storm! Guided Reading is fully underway with the focus on non-fiction texts. New, exciting titles like.



Canadian Owl Guide, The Arctic Tundra, Fish with Attitude, and Living in a Freezer-The Antarctica Book. We meet every week in our reading groups and work on reading strategies, fluency, and comprehension. This month

we have been talking about making connections as we read and self-monitor or ask ourselves questions while we read.

<u>TIP:</u> When your child brings home reading home, listen to them read orally for just a few minutes each evening. { Listen....Is your child pausing appropriately for punctuation? Is your child selfcorrecting while he/she reads orally? Does your child read with expression? Does your child's reading flow smoothly in medium-large phrases? In Grade 4, we are making a daily habit of improving these reading skills. } October is a month to make a conscious effort to think about and write about all we are thankful for. Our writing journals have been a place to reflect on what we are grateful for and why. Halloween Cinquain poems were a fright and the students came up with some very descriptive adjectives.

In math this month, we are wrapping up our first unit on Whole Numbers to 10 000. This is a large unit with many important number



concepts. Addition strategies, subtraction strategies, ordering numbers, problem solving, representing numbers in a variety of ways, etc have been our focus the past two months. We will continue to practice these concepts throughout the year, in our math journals and weekly review. November will bring our second math unit on multiplying and dividing!

(\*\*\*Please make sure to check your child's agenda nightly. The agenda will contain important notes, homework, as well the odd math activity for your child to complete.\*\*\*)

In Social Studies, we are currently learning all about Canada's provinces and territories. We have been engaged in a variety of activities where we can practice matching and naming each province/territory with its capital city.





#### EXCHANGE STUDENT EXPERIENCE



Since 2013, Park West School Division has had a student exchange with a large secondary school in Denmark. The partnership was initiated by one of their staff (Peter Daamgard Lund) who was an exchange student himself at Strathclair School in 1991-1992

This year Brooke Schellenberg, a Grade 12 student at HCI from Kenton and Nanna Nerskov, a 17-year old who will graduate in the next school year from Denmark spent, 6 weeks in each other's home and school as part of the exchange program.

Brooke traveled first to Denmark in August with school already in session. It was her first time traveling so far and being away from home for so long. It was also her first time on an airplane, so it was quite an exciting, but a bit scary making this trip on her own. While in Denmark, she spent time at the beach, though it was a little chilly for swimming, went to farmer's markets and flea markets. She also traveled to Copenhagen where they did a lot of sightseeing including the little mermaid statue in the harbour, many museums and the Queen's Palace. Nanna arrived in Manitoba in mid-September. She has done a lot of traveling, visiting most countries in Europe as well as a trip to New York City. While in Canada she has marveled at the amount of space there is here and how even in town there is so much space between houses. She also made a trip to Clear Lake and enjoyed seeing animals in the wild, something she had never seen before.

The schools were quite different not only in size. There is a much different way of scheduling in Denmark. The school days were each different, with some days totally devoted to sports or other activities and on other days having 4 ninety minute classes. This is quite different to HCI's 5 period day which does not change. Brooke also felt that it was a different atmosphere. All the students in the school are 15 to 20 years old and are treated more like adults. Language that would get you in trouble here, was used freely even in classrooms. The school in Aarhus is designated as a green school and one big difference is that all assignments are done on computer, with virtually nothing printed.

When asked what they missed most about home, Brooke without hesitation said, "my mom". Nanna also said family and friends were the things she missed most.

Both girls felt the exchange program was a valuable experience with both saying that it was great to see how people live in different parts of the world.



The Jazz band (small but mighty) has also shown progress and we are almost at the point of being performance ready with a couple of our tunes, and that's with some students playing a second instrument!

A reminder that the first concert of the year is Tuesday November 27 at 7:30pm. Please ensure that your students have black dress pants, black dress socks, and black dress shoes for the concert. While we sometimes think of this as a small thing, Mr. Pearen mentioned, at the Grade 8 Camp, that he knew a band would sound good just by the way they dressed and entered and exited the stage. Sometimes it is the small things that make a huge difference.

Further, a reminder to parents about getting the band rental forms and fees in as soon as possible. The students will need to have their band t-shirts ordered soon if they require a new shirt.. Finally, a reminder to encourage your student to take that instrument home and play! We usually have a few days between classes and as the old saying goes "if you don't use it, you lose it". Regular practice will lead to big gains in your student's confidence in playing their instrument.
