Kindergarten News




We have even written a poem called Introducing Me and stories about going to the

science, and we have been looking at levers, inclined planes, and wheels and axles.


We have also started our independent spelling program where each student will have the opportunity to work with the words they personally struggle with.



From the Guidance Office....by Mr. Czarnecki

The year is off to a quick start and the Guidance Office has been a busy place in September!

Every Grade 12 student has a guidance meeting scheduled in September or October with the guidance counselor, Mr. Czarnecki, to discuss their current credit situation and courses that they will be taking this year. This is to ensure that everyone is "on track" to graduate in June with at least 30 credits. Also discussed at this meeting are the student's future plans after high school. If the student is planning to attend university or community college information is shared about programs, requirements and career pathways. Sometimes, depending on the program, application forms are given to the student and Spend-A-Day programs are suggested. A follow up meeting is also scheduled in February after the first semester is completed. Every Grade 11 student has a similar meeting with Mr. Czarnecki in November and December.

Scholarships and Bursaries

Scholarship and bursary applications for post-secondary schools will begin to arrive shortly and will continue to arrive throughout the year. Posters giving information for national and provincial scholarships are posted on the Guidance bulletin board next to the library. Additionally, Mr. Czarnecki also passes on scholarship information to individual students who meet the specific application criteria – this is often related to having a minimum academic average which is often 85% or higher and exceptional community and school involvement.

Sometimes independent scholarships are related to specific activities the students are involved in such as participation in certain community sports and activities to community volunteerism. Other scholarships are directly related to the student's anticipated field of post-secondary study. Again, students who have these qualifications or future plans are given an application by Mr. Czarnecki for them to complete and submit.

Students are also encouraged to visit the many scholarship websites found on the Internet. Scholarshipscanada.com and Studentawards.com are two good starting points for students and parents to explore.

Bursaries are special awards provided by businesses or government agencies to encourage economically disadvantaged students to continue with their post-secondary education. These are also given to students who meet the requirements.

Qualifying for and completing the required paperwork for scholarships and bursaries does in many cases require a significant time commitment from the student. Often in addition to filling out the applications forms, students are required to write essays, obtain reference letters and even participate in selection panel interviews. This seems like a lot of work to many students but the potential rewards are certainly worth it! As is witnessed every year at graduation, HCI students are very competitive is receiving scholarship awards and are encouraged to apply for any award that they meet the requirements for.

Hamiota Collegiate also provides school based scholarships that are donated by local businesses and organizations. The recipients of these awards are selected by a school scholarship committee headed by Principal Zilkey. These awards do not have application forms as all graduates are considered for these awards.
