Welcome to our first edition of the school newsletter for the 2016-2017 school year. The doors of Hamiota Elementary School and Hamiota Collegiate are once again open to exuberant and energetic students who are eager to grow and learn, with the guidance of our committed staff and you, the parents and guardians. We welcome new staff members to our school this year: Ms. Catherine Stebeleski (Grade 6), Ms. Erica Snyder (Senior Science and Math), and Mr. Ryan Coughlan (K-6 PE). Our greatest appreciation is extended to our custodians for doing a wonderful job in getting our building ready for our staff and students. With teacher preparations and summer cleaning we are ready for a very productive year ahead.

Again this year, school will begin at 8:30 am and end at 3:15 pm at the elementary. Please ensure that your child arrives no earlier than 8:30 am as that is the earliest time supervision will be in place in the morning. The schedule at Hamiota Collegiate is a new one, with the school moving to a five period day. The opening school bell will be 8:30 am, with classes beginning at 8:57 am. School dismisses at 3:13 pm at the collegiate.

As each school year begins, enrollment is completed and the number of students attending each school is calculated. There are 129 students registered at HES, while 146 have registered at HCI. The schools are once again offering a variety of diverse curricular options, but are also offering a number of different extracurricular opportunities. The school year is not even a month old and we have already had a wellattended open house at the elementary school and hosted our first blood donor Soccer, volleyball and golf are clinic. underway for both the high school and middle years. The annual Terry Fox Walk is place scheduled to take Fridav on September 30 at 11:00 am, with the elementary students being joined bv students from the collegiate.

As always, we believe that communication between home and school is essential in order for parents to stay informed of their children's progress, as well as events and functions that are occurring at school. We hope that you will regularly visit the school websites and follow us on twitter. A monthly newsletter will be emailed or sent home on a regular basis as well. The **Terry Fox Run** is an annual non-competitive charity event held in numerous regions

and his Marathon of Hope and to raise money for cancer research.



The event was founded in 1981 by Isadore Sharp who contacted Terry in hospital by telegram and expressed his wishes to hold an annual run in Terry's name to raise funds for cancer research. Sharp himself had lost a son to cancer in 1979. The event is held every year in the fall. Since its inception, it has

around the world in commemoration of Canadian Cancer activist Terry Fox,

raised via the 'Terry Fox Foundation' close to \$500 million dollars . The run itself is informal which means that the distance often varies, usually between 5 and 15 kilometres; participation is considered to be more important than completing the set distance. Welcome back students and parents! I am excited for another school year with lots of learning and fun.

We are excited that most of our new furniture has arrived for our Accentuated Learning Classroom. We have cool seating such as 4 new rocking chairs, 6 standing height chairs and a couple of hokki stools. We also have 3 new individual desks, 2 standing height desks and a touchdown station (teacher/small group station). We are still waiting for some table legs to convert two of our current tables into standing height. We also have a wiggle seat and therabands for the bottoms of some chairs. The students are really enjoying the different options and flexibility this environmant offers.

In math we have been busy learning about place value working with larger numbers to 10 000. We have also started using "The Addition Station". This is an independent program which students work through at their own pace, practicing addition strategies – up to the 1000s. All students are really enjoying this so far.

In ELA, we have been working on developing more detailed sentences in our writing activity called, "The Long and the Short of it". Students have created posters of "Things I Can't Imagine Life Without". Very soon we will be starting a mini writing unit, "Literacy Through Photos". Students will have an opportunity to do a variety of writing using special photos from home, as well as photos they take at school.

In science we have just started our unit on Habitats and Communities.

During our language arts time we have been working on the Typin' Time program and doing a bit of a "ME" unit. We have talked about the things we


love, those things we are an expert on, and the best and worst times in our life. In science we have been working on a unit called Simple Machines, and have talked about and experimented with levers, in-


MISS SNYDER
