Blayden-I wish I had 100 chicken fingers. I would NOT want 100 cows.

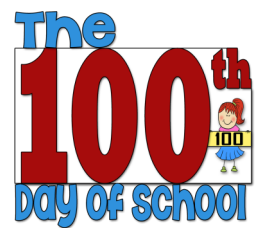

"Hello Princess. Will you marry me?"

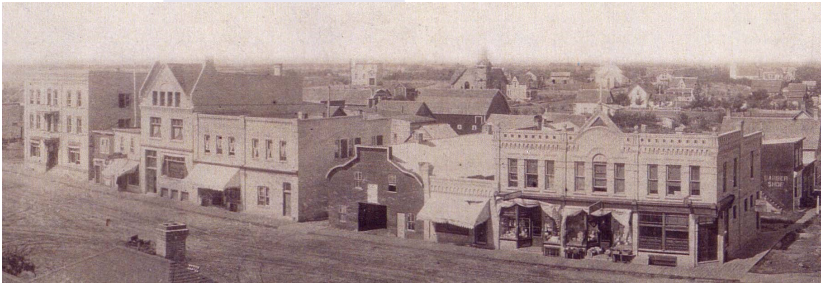
"NO. You are not nice and you do not keep your promises."

## Grade Two News by Mrs. Gregory

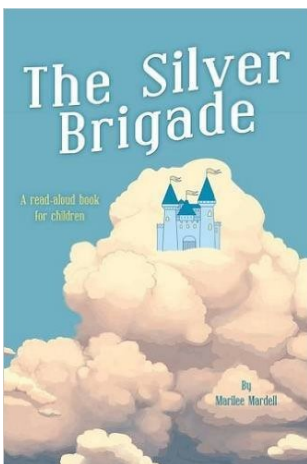

With only one month left in the school year, we are looking forward to Fun Day and our annual Field Trip.

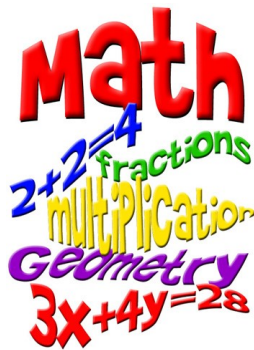
## Grade 3 News by Mrs. Faye Nowosad

There is one more week left in our May reading challenge. So far we are on track to celebrate with some banana splits and extra time outside!! Great job reading!

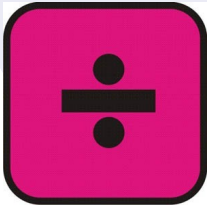
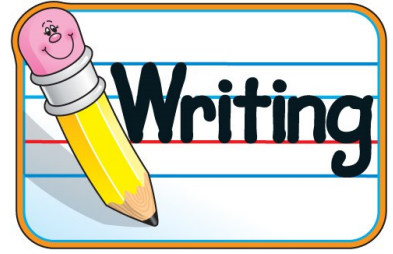


We have lots of exciting events coming up over the next few weeks, and still lots of work to do. It's going to be a busy few weeks!!

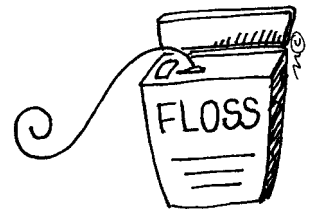
In Math, we've been working on division and have found out how closely related it is to multiplication! We're now learning about fractions and have discovered how they are related to division. Math is all about patterns!

It's Fractions and Decimals GALORE in Grade 4! We have been exploring fractions of a whole and fractions of a set! Is it true that  $\frac{1}{3}$  of one pizza can be greater than  $\frac{1}{3}$  of another pizza? You bet! Ask your child to show you how! Decimals are our focus right now and we have been working with tenths, hundredths, and equivalent decimals as well. \*\*\*Just a reminder – CNP's will be completed at school for the month of June!



In Science we are exploring Habitats and Communities. Recently, we have read about the beaver and its complex habitat. We have learned about a beaver colony in Sweden that relocated beaver kits to Austria to encourage a beaver population once again in that country. Did you know that beavers actually aren't a nuisance? Beavers are necessary to maintain water in natural habitats. They are actually a sign of a healthy local environment. Soon, we will be studying the biomes of the world and the characteristics of each biome. We plan on incorporating this into next week's art lesson! Stay tuned!

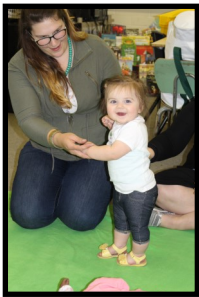

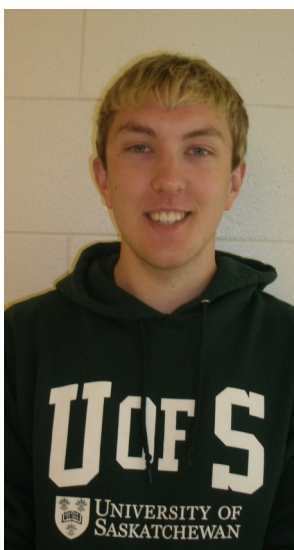
## Students Participate in Chemistry Week Activities by Mr. Coulter
